Nursery

We have been learning about different types of minibeasts. We found beetles, woodlice and centipedes under logs and we have caterpillars in our classroom. The caterpillars are growing bigger every day, and we are very excited to watch as they change into butterflies while learning the story, 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' during Talk 4 Writing.

Reception



Reception have had a very busy start to the half term! We were excited to receive a delivery of some caterpillars which we have been watching closely and predicting how they might grow and change. This has inspired lots of mark making in both classes as we have been drawing caterpillar life cycles and writing about the changes we have noticed. We have also explored habitats for different minibeasts in the garden and orchard. We are looking forward to seeing what happens next as our caterpillars continue to grow.





We have also begun our new Talk 4 Writing text: The Paper Dolls. We have been retelling the story using story language, creating story maps, and even making paper dolls of our own.

Year 1



Year 1 went to the Orchard for an outdoor learning day. We learnt to tie Clove Hitch knots and made art out of natural materials. We also looked at the types of trees that are in the orchard which carried on from our learning at Epping Forest. The afternoon was very muddy due to the rain, but Year 1 used the weather to set challenges for each other in the afternoon.



Year 2

In year 2 we have been very busy in our literacy lessons learning the text 'The Tear Thief'. The children have been retelling the story creating actions and have begun to adapt the story to create their own characters too!



In music, a few children have played some songs they have been learning on the keyboard to the rest of the class. The tunes were enjoyed by everybody!





Year 3




In Geography, we have been learning about the countries of the United Kingdom. We have learnt what the capital cities are, any other important cities, the mountains, hills and rivers of the UK.


In Computing, we have been learning about desktop publishing. This has involved learning how to add text to Microsoft Publisher and Word, changing the font, increasing the font size, adding colour to the font and adding pictures. We then created posters about a UK country, about the facts we have learned and using what we have learned in

Geography and Computing. Here are some of our posters!

Year 4

We have been learning about digital images and how a lot of images on the internet are edited in some way. We have learnt how to remove parts of an image, merge parts of two images together and apply a number of effects.





Year 5

Year 5 took part in the Welwyn Garden Dance festival on 27th March at Campus West Theatre. After



weeks of choreography and rehearsals the children shone on the stage. Year 5 thank Miss Attfield (a trained dancer) for her choreography skills.

Year 6

We have been working very hard over the last few weeks in preparation for our SATs whilst also enjoying the new topics in other areas of the curriculum.

In Science, we have begun learning all about electricity. We named all the appliances we use in our everyday life that require electricity, either mains or battery operated. Then, we were given a task to illuminate a bulb with only one bulb, one wire and a cell. Some of us managed to do this but we realised we would need 2 wires to make a safe and complete circuit.

In Geography, we have started to learn all about our local area — Welwyn Garden City. We started the topic by using iPads to locate Welwyn Garden City in the whole world — to do this we had to find Europe, then the UK, before finding England and searching for nearby cities (like London) to help us find Hertfordshire and Welwyn Garden City. We then had lots of fun looking at an O.S. Map of St Albans and Hatfield. We looked at what lots of the symbols meant, located our school and named human and physical features in our town.



Anti-Abuse Curriculum

In order to embed the Anti-Abuse Curriculum into our teaching, each half term we are focusing on one theme which we will discuss in our classrooms during snack and discussion time. This half term, we are focusing on **Body and Relationship Safety**. Some objectives link closely with our PSHE topic – Relationships. Here are just some of the things we have been discussing across the school:

- I know that I may not touch anyone without their permission (consent).
- I know that no-one has the right to say unkind things to me intended to make me feel bad about myself.
- I understand that we cannot like everyone, but we should treat everyone with respect. If I feel I cannot like someone else, I know that does not give me the right to disrespect or abuse them.
- I know how to get support if I am in physical danger and can support other people to get help if they are in this situation.
- I know that there are parts of my body that are private and should usually only be touched by me or, if I am sick or hurt, by doctors, nurses or parents/carers who I know are trying to make me better (and that this should be witnessed by another person of my choosing).
- I know that no-one should ever expect, pressure or force me to allow them to touch or have photographs of me.
- I know how to say no or how to get help if someone is pressuring me.

RE Day

On Tuesday 23rd April, the children enjoyed a visit from John Hardwick for an R.E. Learning Day. As it was St George's Day, John's teaching was based around 'What makes a true champion'.

John taught us about the qualities of sportsmanship using a mixture of music, songs, juggling stories, Bible stories and puppets in an exciting, engaging and interactive way.

We looked at the Olympics and learned how to be a good sport by looking at the value of sport and sporting values such as perseverance, being a team player, having **direction**, **dedication**, and **determination**.



The Great Big Dance Off

Last month we entered a team into a national dance competition for schools called The Great Big Dance Off. Our 3 minute dance entry was on the theme of being brave and speaking out against bullying. The children danced beautifully and had a wonderful time.



School Council visit to Westminster Abbey

We were lucky enough to obtain a few tickets to the Commonwealth ceremony at Westminster Abbey, so we put the names of our School Council representatives into a hat as this was the fairest

way to decide who went.



We had enough time to take in a few sights along the way.

Online Safety

May's Online Safety focus is 'Self Image and Identity'. At home, please could you have a discussion with your child regarding this area.

In EYFS and KS1, it could be discussing what to do if something happens that makes them feel sad, worried, uncomfortable or frightened.



In Lower KS2, we have been discussing how people can represent themselves in different ways online and not to fully trust everything as how it appears. In upper KS2, we have been discussing how to make responsible choices about having an online identity.

Online Gaming



Playing games with their friends online is incredibly popular with children. The most popular online games which children are using in the juniors are Minecraft, Roblox and Fortnite. All of these games have the option of communicating with other players — by voice or text.

It is not uncommon for children to report that they have received mean / hurtful comments from unknown players, friends of friends and even their friends. All these games offer parental controls to restrict and monitor the type of communication that can take place. By default, there is not usually much restriction set. If you haven't done so recently, please check the settings on your children's games.

Also, face to face, children can usually tell when a comment that they have made has caused offence or has been misinterpreted. They can then quickly apologies or clarify what they meant. When playing online games, where this reaction can't be seen, some children don't realise that they have caused upset, or think about how they 'come across'.

We always recommend that children use devices in a room where they can be monitored – not only to keep them safe but also so they can be guided by an adult when their comments could be misinterpreted. Emotion of the month

This half term we are teaching children to understand the emotion of surprise!

Surprise can be either positive or negative, depending on the context and the individual's interpretation of the situation.

- Positive Surprise: Surprise can be a positive emotion when
 it results from something unexpected but enjoyable or
 beneficial. For example, receiving a thoughtful gift,
 achieving an unexpected success, or encountering a pleasant surprise can evoke feelings of
 happiness, excitement, and delight.
- 2. **Negative Surprise**: Conversely, surprise can also be negative when it arises from something unexpected and unpleasant or threatening. For instance, receiving bad news, experiencing a sudden loss, or encountering a frightening situation can evoke feelings of shock, fear, or distress.

In both cases, **surprise** is **characterised** by a sudden shift in one's expectations or understanding of a **situation**. Whether it is perceived as positive or negative depends on factors such as personal beliefs, previous experiences, and the specific circumstances surrounding the surprise event.



National Walking Month

Free School Meals

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2

All children can get a free lunch at school if they're in Reception class, Year 1 or Year 2. If you register, your school could get extra funding (called 'Pupil Premium') which will benefit your child. Have your National Insurance number or Home Office number to hand when you apply.

Children in Year 3 or older

Your child can get a free school meal if you receive any of the following:

Income Support

Income based Jobseekers Allowance

Income-related Employment and Support Allowance

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit

Child Tax Credit (as long as you're not entitled to Working Tax Credit and you don't get more than £16,190 a year)

Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit) Universal Credit (with annual earned income of no more than £7,400 after tax and not including any benefits you get).

Apply today if you receive any of these benefits. It takes 5 minutes to apply. Have your National Insurance number or Home Office number to hand when you apply.

If your child is currently in Year 2, and is eligible for Free School Meals, you will need to reapply when they go up into Year 3.

Working together to improve school attendance

Being in school and having the best attendance possible underpins all the many benefits of school for your child, such as their learning, wellbeing and wider development.

For some children, attending school every day will be harder than for others. This is why we are committed to working together with families to solve problems and support your child's school attendance.

What YOU must do:

Telephone the school before 8.30am each day of your child's absence.

If you are not sure whether your child is well enough to attend school, send them in anyway as they often perk up on arrival.

Is my child too ill for school? - NHS (www.nhs.uk)

Tell the school in advance, of any medical appointments and bring in appointment cards/letters. If possible, make appointments out of school hours to avoid missed learning.

If you and your child are experiencing difficulties with school attendance, then talk to us as a first step so we can help.

What WE will do:

Check your child's attendance every day.

Phone home to discuss your child's attendance with you.

Invite you into school for attendance meetings if we are concerned.

If we cannot establish a reason for absence, then we may make a welfare home visit.



Term time holidays

We are unable to authorise term time holidays. Absence can only be authorised if a child is unwell. If however, the number of unauthorised sessions reaches 15 or more within 2 terms, the local authority may issue you with a Penalty Notice. The Penalty Notice requires parents to pay a fine of £60 within 21 days. If this is not paid within the time limit, the penalty rises to £120 which must be paid within 28 days.

Term time holidays have a negative impact on friendships and learning. Please avoid taking your child out of school. Term time holidays are not authorised. Absence requests can only be authorised is there are exceptional, unrepeatable circumstances. Section 7 Education Act 1996 places a duty on parents to ensure that their child of compulsory age attends school.











We are an Encompass School working with external agencies to support children who are victims of domestic abuse.
